Congratulations on your acceptance to Carleton! It is my pleasure to introduce you to our college's [Public Policy Program](#). Although it hasn't been around very long, the [Public Policy minor](#) evolved from a long-standing and popular interdisciplinary program in Political Economy that was a bridge between our two largest social science departments. The current PPOL minor is even more interdisciplinary. It includes core and upper-level classes from the humanities and STEM departments as well as a wider range of social science offerings. It's already one of the most popular minors on campus and is fulfilling our goal of attracting a diverse group of students who represent an array of disciplines from physics and math to languages, literature and arts.

The program is designed to encourage students to cultivate an interest in public issues and policy making while helping them to develop the tools to participate and, perhaps, find service roles in civic and community affairs. Our classes emphasize the importance of ethics, accountability, integrity, professional competence, efficiency, objectivity, respect, equity, and fairness in the development and evaluation of policy.

Although not required, we encourage students pursuing the minor to focus their advanced work in concentration areas such as Public Health, National Security, the Environment or Education (to name a few). Regardless of specialty, these courses highlight the importance of positioning public policy within the context of global, social, economic, technological and demographic changes. For example our mandatory bridge class, POSC 265, is called *Public Policy and Global Capitalism*.

Although the epidemic led us to cancel the Public Policy [off-campus study](#) opportunity in Washington DC in 2022, this may be good news for incoming students as we are on the schedule of programs for 2024! While in the capital we will engage with policymakers, interest groups, analysts and activists on a range of policy issues. The OCS term also incorporates an internship, intended to enhance experiential learning and professional resume-building, and coursework designed to build collaborative research and analytical skills.
