FOCUS

European feminist and LGBTQ issues and policies, feminist and queer theory, cross-cultural feminist methodology

OVERVIEW

The program travels to three countries in thirteen weeks while exploring Women's and Gender Studies issues across Europe comparatively in the Netherlands (Utrecht with day trips to Amsterdam), Germany (Berlin), and the Czech Republic (Prague and Olomouc). Housing varies between shared apartments, home stays (Berlin), and student dormitories.

ESSENTIALS

- The program operates every fall from mid-August to mid-November
- Applications open in November and are accepted until March 15
- Accepted students must commit to participation by the end of April

ACADEMICS

Director: Iveta Jusová, Professor of Gender, Women's & Sexuality Studies

Coursework is accredited and transcripts are issued by Carleton College. Students enroll in four courses for a total of the Carleton-equivalent of 16 semester credits.



- Learn from artists, activists, the directors of local NGO's and professors from affiliated European universities
- Design and carry out independent research on an individualized topic within the field of Women's and Gender Studies
