- John Dewey, The Public and Its Problems (multiple editions and republications of this 1927 book)—the classic account of the nature of democracy not simply as a form of government but as a form of life, with special emphasis on the roles of inquiry and communication in democratic cultures.
- 2. Reginia Rini, "Fake News and Partisan Epistemology" (2017, https://kiej.georgetown.edu/fake-news-partisan-epistemology/)—a short analysis of the concept of fake news and the nature of social media testimony, with a constructive look at the institutional changes needed to address problems.

- 3. Bill Bishop, The Big Short: Why the Clustering of Like-Minded America Is Tearing Us
 Apart (Mariner Books, 2009)—a demographic data-driven account (way backin 2009!) of how
 Americans have "sorted" themselves into communities of the like-minded increasingly unable to
 understand others.

Tom Nichols, The Death of Expertise: The Campaign Against Established Knowledge and Why it Matters(Oxford U P, 2018)—a critical analysis of what the author calls internet- and social media-fueled "intellectual egalitarianism" and the sense that everyone's views are just as good as anyone else's.
- 5. Michiko Kakutani, **The Death of Truth: Notes on Falsehood in the Age of Trump** (Duggan Books, 2018)—an examination of the social trends and causes of the replacement of truth by propaganda and conspiracy theories, the replacement of expertise by the views of insular communities that confirm their own biases, and the replacement of science with subjective ideas of "my truth."
- 6. Mikael Klintman, **Knowledge Resistance: How we avoid insight from others** (Manchester, 2018)—how (biologically, economically, socially) people ignore, resist and ultimately deny available knowledge from other persons and cultures.
- 7. Charlie Kirk, **The MAGA Doctrine: The Only Ideas That Will Win the Future** (Broadside, 2020)—an account of the importance of self-rule by groups long ignored and taken for granted by its "rulers"—and a way for folks not in those groups to see a different perspective
