Dear Provost Mattson and Members of the FCPC,

The Department of French and Francophone Studies requests approval for a tenure-track position in pre-20th century French and Francophone literature culture beginning in the 2024-25 academic year.

# Trajectory of our department

Our department is on the verge of a period of substantial transition. Besides the imminent retirement this coming June of Christine Lac (who will be replaced by Sarah Anthony, our new full-time faculty on a continuing appointment), this spring is Cathy Yandell's last teaching term before retirement. In addition, Scott Carpenter has been on phased retirement since last fall. After this term, he will teach one last time in the spring of 2024 for Carleton's Paris program before retiring. Finally, in the next 3-4 years, we anticipate the retirements of two other tenured faculty, Chérif Keïta and Éva Pósfay, which will bring the department from seven down to three faculty members: the aforementioned FOCA faculty, the part-time lecturer Stephanie Cox, and the newly tenured Sandra Rousseau. While we are grateful to have been allowed to hire a Visiting Professor for 2023-24, we also recognize the urgency of undertaking a tenure-track search this coming year for the long-term stability of our department.

Our request is broad as our needs are multiple. We envision a position that will complement Sandra Rousseau's, hence the specialty can be of any time period before the 20th century, which means the Middle Ages up to the 19th century. Furthermore, we purposely selected a wide variety of areas of study after careful consideration of crucial courses taught by soon-to-be retirees (gender studies, for example) and important new fields in current scholarship that we would like to add to our department (ecocriticism, for example). We believe any one of these compelling fields will greatly enrich our curriculum and that students will respond to them very favorably. These disciplines include the following: pre-colonial and colonial studies, Francophone diaspora, visual studies, critical race theory, gender and queer studies, disability studies, ecocriticism, and science in literature and culture. We are confident that the time periods and the areas of study listed here will attract a wide pool of applicants, because it is exactly what

happened this year when we used an almost identical list of fields during our search for the visiting professor position.

Should we be allowed to undertake a tenure-track search in 2023-24, we anticipate many more applicants than for this year's visiting faculty job since tenure-track positions in French and Francophone Studies are scarce. We will continue our efforts to reach out to our many professional communities such as H-France, le Conseil National d'Études Francophones, and the Society for Early Modern French Studies (beyond the usual channels such as the Modern Language Association) to get the word out about this tenure-track opportunity with the intention of further diversifying our department's faculty. We are deeply committed to Carleton's IDE endeavors. For this position, we seek strong candidates who will not only contribute to such work within the department, but also establish meaningful collaborations throughout the College.

### Curriculum

Carleton's French and Francophone studies curriculum is remarkable for its originality: it encompasses both historical exploration and contemporary inquiry, both broad, thematic questions ("Classics Reimagined") and specific events that shape the world ("The Algerian War of Liberation"). It has long shaped numerous students who pursue careers in which their understanding of foreign visual, literary, and cultural texts allows them to make a difference in their respective fields. Our language sequence has remained healthy over the years, attracting students who wish to study in Paris, read Camus's writing in the original, or pursue their French or Creole heritage languages. Our upper-division classes (all taught in French) have been affected by the cancellation of two consecutive Paris programs; however, we expect those classes to regain momentum, given the current filled-beyond-capacity enrollments in our lower-division language sequence. Typically classes are rotated every four to six years so that one given class of students can take upper-level classes every term. Logistically and intellectually it means that everyone of the FFS faculty teaches material from their specialization and stretches that field, whether in terms of theoretical approach, time frame, or geographical areas. Not unlike many languages departments in the United States however, the department needs to ensure its enrollments remain stable. To that purpose, many classes have tended to be 20th- and 21st-century heavy, even when faculty members make a point to include materials from the pre-1900s. The hiring of Anthony Revelle as our new VAP for the coming academic year is a first step in the enrichment of our departmental curriculum. In order to keep improving the aforementioned imbalance, the department needs contributors with pre-20th century specializations.

Since Sandra Rousseau's hiring in 2015, Medieval and Early Modern Studies have changed drastically to better address colonial, queer, and ecocritical frameworks, traditionally reserved for 20th and 21st century texts. While Carleton's commitments to IDE spreads across numerous facets of College life and its organization, departments' curriculum also constitute a crucial

nexus where theoretical and practical knowledge on inclusion and diversity must meet. Hiring a specialist able to participate and amp up our efforts to decolonize and queer our curriculum is an investment for a student body that will know how to argue for a fairer and more diverse world both on and off campus. Similarly the College's decision to divest from fossil fuel, a move originally largely carried by students, points not only to the urgency of fighting climate change but to our intellectual obligation to think in terms of ecology. Recent hires in other humanities departments highlight the ecocritical turn Carleton is taking, and we want to be able to fully participate in this welcome change. The new tenure-track professor in our department will have to be pedagogically and intellectually committed to these topics. Our search for a VAP position in the Fall and Winter of this academic year has given us confidence that our curricular needs can be filled by excellent and creative professors.

We hope to hire a colleague who will teach classes principally on pre-20th century cultural and literary material from the French and Francophone world, and will be able to address at least one of subfields in which we currently do not have experts: gender, sexuality, and queer studies, and ecocriticism. This decision is of course based on what the department considers to be an intellectually rigorous curriculum, and on what students have noted as topics they would like to explore in our classes. In striving to balance institutional and academic demands, the department hopes to demonstrate its dedication to the College's mission.

# Links to IDE Strategic Goals

Since the mid 80s, when the French department was fundamentally Eurocentric in its scope of vision, it has strived with great success to be inclusive of all the other regions where the French language has become a means of political and cultural expression as a result of past colonial domination in Africa (North and West), the Middle East and various parts of Asia.

Understanding that historical fact and integrating it in our curriculum has been a key mission for the department. Changing our name to French and Francophone Studies and the move away from a century-based definition of our courses to a more thematic one have enabled the department to make inclusion a central pillar of our pedagogy. Thus, all our courses are designed for the purpose of questioning the silences and omissions of the past, be they about the multifaceted effects of slavery, colonialism (political, social and cultural) or sexism and other forms of discrimination and marginalization. More than ever, we are committed to supporting the College's goals of IDE, not only at this juncture of great demographic change (the retirement of two tenured professors) in our department but also as we reshape our curriculum for the coming years and decades.

If we receive a positive response to our request for a tenure-track position, we will be attentive, among other things, to candidates who bring with them an awareness of the needs to challenge the gendered nature of the French language, as part of a movement that, interestingly enough, is gaining a greater momentum outside France itself, among the Francophone communities of

North America and other locations traditionally considered as the "periphery" of the French landscape. We will give priority to candidates who will work to attract and nurture students of the most diverse origins and identities through their teaching and their community engagement on this campus and beyond. At present, we are very pleased with the already significant diversity we see in our classes, our off-campus programs and in the cultural activities jointly organized by our French Language Associates and the student council. But more can always be done, particularly in order to draw the growing number of students of recent immigration origin, from Francophone Africa and elsewhere.

Finally, we see the tenure-track position as a timely opportunity to swing the pendulum of our department's gender representation, which has gone very noticeably to one end. Creating a better balance will be in line with the College's IDE goals.

# **Connections to Interdisciplinary Programs**

The French and Francophone Studies Department has long cultivated a tradition of dialogue and diversity across campus through the participation of several of its faculty members in vigorous and bold interdisciplinary programs and initiatives. Those efforts have led, to name a few, to the birth of the Humanities Center and the Center of Global and Regional Studies (CGRS), high-profile and impactful drivers of Carleton's educational mission as a Liberal Arts institution. This departmental commitment to interdisciplinarity has not only had a visible impact on our course offerings, several of which are cross-listed, but has also resulted in very successful team-teaching experiments over the years. The new tenure-track position will definitely give us an opportunity to honor this Carleton tradition and continue our exciting synergies with several possible partners such as Africana Studies, Visual Studies (CAMS and Art and Art History), Medieval and Renaissance Studies, Gender, Women's and Sexuality Studies, Middle Eastern Studies, and others.

### Mentoring

The face of French and Francophone Studies will change rapidly over the next few years. While this document has demonstrated that it has undeniable repercussions on the curriculum and our departmental IDE goals, we wish to underline briefly how crucial the timeline of this hire seems to us. In the coming years Éva Pósfay and Chérif Keïta will be the only members of our department with substantial institutional and departmental memory. Sandra Rousseau was granted tenure in February 2023 and will be available to guide her new colleague and help them navigate life on campus as a junior faculty member. Nonetheless, it is paramount that the new hire be able to observe and interact substantially, including on the evaluation process, with both Éva Pósfay and Chérif Keïta before they retire. This will allow the new colleague to benefit from multiple perspectives on the department, its past, and its new directions. Finally, a considerable dimension of mentoring is done informally; only through time and coexistence within a department can certain existential questions be brought to the fore. To put it more forcefully,

approval of our request for a TT hire at this momentous juncture seems central to our survival as a stable and thriving department of the humanities.

# Tentative job ad for the French and Francophone Studies tenure-track position

The Department of French and Francophone Studies at Carleton College invites applications for a tenure-track position in French (beginning September 1, 2024). Candidates should have a specialization in pre-20th century literature and culture. Areas of particular interest include critical race theory, gender and queer studies, pre-colonial and early colonial studies, Francophone diaspora, visual studies, disability studies, ecocriticism, and science in literature and culture. Teaching responsibilities include French language and literature courses from the beginning/intermediate to the advanced seminar level, including courses in the candidate's area of expertise. The teaching load is 5 courses during the year, spread across three ten-week terms. We encourage applicants with an engaged, dynamic, and communicative teaching style, as well as a demonstrated commitment to scholarly research and publishing.
