Dear Provost Mattson and members of the FCPC,

This letter presents the unanimous agreement of my department for the proposal to hire a tenure-track professor of the politics of **sub-Saharan Africa**. My department colleagues Dev Gupta and Al Montero developed initial draft for this proposal. They both reached out to several academic institutions across the nation and spoke with eminent scholars of the politics of sub-Saharan Africa. The department as a whole met on March 28, 2023 to discuss the draft proposal and deliberated on the benefit of hiring an Africanist for the College and for our department.

The Political Science department respectfully requests permission to hire a tenure-track professor who specializes in the politics of sub-Saharan Africa in AY 2023-24. We believe that hiring in this particular area is of fundamental importance and would represent a strategic investment by the College at an opportune moment that will pay long-term dividends for the College at multiple levels. In this proposal, we will first outline what we see as the curricular importance of hiring a social scientist specializing in sub-Saharan Africa (hereafter SSA) for the institution as a whole before addressing the benefits for the political science department, which include thematic and curricular diversity, stronger regional and cross-regional coverage, methodological innovation, and staffing efficiencies. We then address how this hire would help build interdisciplinary strength and contribute to programs like Africana Studies before concluding with our plans for recruiting a strong pipeline and post-hire mentoring plans were we to be granted this line.

The benefits of hiring an Africanist for the College

Sub-Saharan Africa contains 15% of the world's population. United Nations data show the continent is growing more than twice as quickly as Latin America and South Asia, putting it on track to double its population by 2050. At that point, it will be home to a quarter of the world's population, half of whom will be under the age of 25 – a set of statistical facts that political scientists know are associated with both desirable and challenging political dynamics, from economic growth to intensified resource competition to urban unrest. Yet, SSA's presence in our curriculum does not reflect its political and social significance. This year, for example, courses that focus on SSA are outnumbered by courses that focus on Europe (which contains 10% of the world's population – a percentage that will dramatically drop over the next 30 years given declining birth rates) by nearly a 2-1 ratio.¹ At the institutional level, an investment in faculty

expertise in this region would address the fact that the study of sub-Saharan Africa is underrepresented at the college while aligning with Strategy 4.1.5 of the IDE strategic plan, which focuses on “the capacity of the faculty to deliver curricular offerings that reflect and support a robust commitment to the values of inclusion, diversity, and equity.”

An investment in a tenure-track line would also provide needed stability to the ranks of faculty who teach in this area. We note, for example, that of the courses offered explicitly on SSA this year, several are taught by visitors, colleagues on continuing appointment, or attached. Excludes courses that name SSA as one region among several that might be the focus in a thematic class and courses that focus on the Black experience in the US, the Caribbean, or in diaspora. Similarly, this excludes courses that name Europe as one region among many. By our rough count, there are 19 courses that explicitly name Europe as the focus versus 11 that explicitly name SSA. This includes off-campus studies courses as well as arts practice courses like West African Dance and West African Drumming. The gap this year is particularly acute, though past years also show a gap.

Specifically, to an off-campus studies program with no other on-campus teaching commitments or presence; of the ten faculty who are offering explicitly SSA-focused courses this academic year, only five are tenure-line and one or more of those individuals (including the only social scientist who is a SSA expert) is nearing retirement. Designating an additional tenure-line hire in this area would add some valuable stability to a faculty cluster with complementary teaching and research interests. Focusing this hire in the social sciences is of unique value to the College. The social sciences² consistently “punch above their weight” in terms of serving students in courses with high enrollments and many majors, but with the fewest faculty lines; according to FAC data, arts & humanities division currently has 107 faculty, STEM has 63 faculty, and the social science division has 43 faculty.³

The benefits of hiring an Africanist for the political science department

This hire is of particular interest to the political science department, which lacks any systematic coverage of SSA politics. As the College diversifies its student population, we also see the demographic composition of our majors changing and with it, demand for courses that center issues and regions that have historically been underrepresented in the discipline. Currently, several faculty members in the department include modules/readings/case studies that incorporate SSA into thematic courses, like ethnic conflict, democratization and autocratization, global public health, and foreign policy. However, given the growing profile of SSA for the study of key questions in political science, this ad hoc approach leaves gaps in departmental expertise, especially given the increasing importance of SSA as a site of inquiry for our discipline and for the social sciences more broadly.

The study of the SSA region not only would close the biggest remaining gap in the political science department’s geographic coverage⁴, it would meaningfully enhance the courses that the

department could offer on core thematic topics that are central to the study of politics in this particular moment in time. In researching the subfield and talking with well-regarded Africa specialists at some of the top doctoral programs in the country⁵, we confirmed that much of the research being done by up-and-coming scholars of SSA would complement and extend the department's existing attention to core topics in the discipline. For example, SSA is, without question, *the* leading place to study competitive authoritarianism – a phenomenon of growing importance as even seemingly stable democracies (e.g., the United States, Hungary, India, and Israel to name but a few) flirt with or slide back into increasingly autocratic practices.⁶ The political science department places considerable emphasis on the study of democracy and dictatorship—our introductory course on comparative politics is organized around this theme, and this year, we are organizing multiple panel discussions that explore the fragility of democracy in different parts of the world – which makes adding a scholar of SSA a step that would enrich and deepen our curriculum.

Apart from core questions about democracy and autocracy, SSA scholars are also producing exciting research on a range of topics that would be of great interest to the political science department, including economic development and ecological sustainability, security and conflict, and poverty and public health. All of these thematic areas would fit well within our current curricular structure and generate considerable student interest by adding significant new and important areas of research and teaching that are less represented in our department such as comparative analysis of colonial legacies and the continuing role of traditional leadership and informal politics in political regimes.

We also note that the study of SSA would also benefit IR/comparative politics colleagues in the department given the interest that many of us have in cross-regional comparison and work. There is considerable synergy, for example, in China-SSA studies focused on Chinese foreign policy and belt-and-road investments, many of which are focused in SSA and which, in turn, has

included in SSA (Summer Forester), East Asia (Huan Gao), and SE Asia (Tun Myint). We have three faculty who cover the US (Christina Farhart, Steve Poskanzer, and our new tenure-track colleague, Ryan Dawkins, who joins us this fall). In addition, Greg Marfleet and Barbara Allen both teach courses that focus on US politics and policy.

We also have connections/introductions to additional key scholars, including Staffan Lindberg (University of Gothenburg, formerly of the University of Florida), Amanda Robinson (The Ohio State University), Claire Adida (UC San Diego), Lee Arriola (UC Berkeley), Jeremy MacMullin (St. Andrews University), Jaime Bleck (University of Notre Dame), and Stefan Andreasson (Queen's University, Belfast), who we plan to enlist in helping develop a robust pipeline of promising young scholars.

become an emerging battleground for China-US rivalry.⁷ SSA-Europe work engages in important cross-cutting questions around migration/refugees, development, and post-colonial legacies. SSA-Middle East work raises pressing questions around migration and security. And having in-house expertise on SSA would also be of value to the international relations side of the department, as the region is a major site for understanding human security and conflict as well as global policy responses to such threats, like the evolving doctrine on humanitarian intervention and how it challenges long-held assumptions about the sanctity of state sovereignty (a principle that evolved out of 17th century European politics and that has been challenged most significantly in the late 20th century by the Organization of African Unity). A SSA hire would enhance the teaching and research that several of us do, while also offering our students more robust opportunities to engage with globalized politics, especially politics that directly connect regions of the Global South.⁸ Given that much writing and research on globalization centers the economically dominant west (as a source of norms, institutions, capital flows, and even cultural products), we see a SSA hire as representing a study of the global *without* the west, given the importance of the region to “South-South” interactions.

In addition to region-focused and thematic courses, we see one additional enormous benefit in hiring a tenure-line colleague in this sub-field: as our respondents informed us, training in SSA politics is among the most innovative and exciting in all of comparative politics and international relations, with a strong focus on experimental field methods. In addition to very strong “core” methodological skills that we would expect from any well-trained comparativists from a high-quality political science program (e.g., advanced statistics and a deep understanding of the comparative method), graduate students working on SSA would be able to bring this focus—which exists across all the excellent doctoral programs—to our methods curriculum, especially our recently introduced three-credit methods “workshops” that are required for all majors.

Experimental field methods⁹ would be an exciting addition to the training we can offer not only to our majors, but to students interested in behavioral economics, sociology, the social science-oriented side of environmental studies, public policy, students interested in the policy side of educational studies, students pursuing careers in global public health, and perhaps even psychologists who are interested in testing hypotheses under non-laboratory conditions. We currently have no faculty teaching this methodology on campus, and given its centrality in the study of SSA politics at this time, it would be a valuable curricular extension for our department and the social sciences more broadly. Finally, while field experiments seem to be *de rigueur* in the subfield (and statistical training expected in any quality political science program), our respondents also stressed that depending on the topic, some SSA scholars are also well-trained in

archival and ethnographic methods; such candidates would also find a place in our existing methods curriculum and majors eager to learn from them.

The methods training of candidates in the SSA field would allow the department to benefit from a number of staffing efficiencies. The hire would be able to teach our methods course (POSC 230), which will free up our Americanist colleagues in particular who must teach the American politics introduction (POSC 122) while helping cover POSC 230. Since we would not necessarily need the new comparativist to offer sections of the comparative introduction (POSC 120),¹⁰ they could focus on POSC 230 as their primary service course responsibility. Having this added flexibility in our staffing would conceivably reduce the need for replacement hiring to cover planned leaves. We note that political science has requested approval to hire quite a few visitors in the past few years to cover leaves, which may reflect the fact that the department last requested a new tenure-line position 18 years ago, despite strong demand from students.

Finally, we think that hiring an SSA-specialist might also be an exciting opportunity to develop new OCS programs in the region, which would be of significant interest not only to our majors, but would have broad appeal across the campus. Currently, the College offers an ecology and anthropology program based in Tanzania, a program that looks at Africa/Arabia cross-regional trade/culture/history (the SSA portion involves Zanzibar), and a winter break trip to Senegal, the next iteration of which is currently canceled. This leaves broad swaths of the continent still open for new OCS programs, including regions (particularly Southern Africa) that could host exciting opportunities for students.

The benefits of hiring an Africanist for interdisciplinary programs

While we propose this hire be located 100% within political science, we believe that a tenure-line hire in SSA politics would have beneficial spillover effects for interdisciplinary programs on campus, with public policy, environmental studies, and most importantly, Africana Studies as key beneficiaries. In our conversation with our respondents, we learned that top Africanist candidates lack the training to teach core courses in Africana Studies, given that such courses at Carleton and elsewhere tend to (a) focus primarily on the Black experience in the United States or the African diaspora *outside of Africa* while Africanists in political science typically focus on *intra-SSA* comparisons, and (b) focus on more humanistic epistemologies. At the same time, a political scientist would be able to offer robust SSA-focused electives that would benefit Africana Studies and build up its focus on social science approaches to understanding SSA. We note, for example, that “social inquiry” is one of the recommended groups in which AFST students can take electives, but only two of the “social inquiry” courses focus on SSA specifically (the rest are about the United States or the African diaspora). One of those courses is offered by a faculty member nearing retirement and one is offered as part of an OCS program taught by a contingent faculty member. As a point of comparison, Bowdoin College, which has what many consider a best-in-class Africana Studies program with 100+ classes available for majors and minors, has 12% of their electives in social sciences with a specific focus on SSA (compared to Carleton’s approximately 2% of classes listed for the major or the minor). An investment in a tenure-track political scientist specializing in SSA will make

solid and much-needed contributions at a crucial time for the building of our Africana Studies curriculum while helping stabilize the program—a key IDE strategic goal for the college (Goal 4.1.4).

We can also anticipate that courses offered by a SSA hire, depending on their scope, may also make contributions at the electives level to the Public Policy minor. Courses that cover in a significant way issues of economic development and poverty, sustainability and climate change, education policy, and global public health would fit under these electives “clusters” in the PPOL minor. Courses on gender and environmental politics —research topics that are considered “hot areas” according to our respondents—could make similar contributions to interdisciplinary programs such as ENTS and GWSS. Once again, our respondents underscored that comparativists of SSA are commonly called upon to participate in interdisciplinary programs and every freshly-minted graduate can expect to make such contributions in their career. We note that *every single member* of the political science department’s comparative politics and IR faculty contributes to at least one interdisciplinary program¹¹, so we have a strong ethos of participation that we can make clear to a new hire.

Building a diverse pool and recruiting strategies

Our respondents gave us a very clear view of the anticipated market of well-trained comparativists of SSA. In all cases, they emphasized that there are few jobs but a surfeit of talent that is graduating now, in post-doctoral positions, or are under-placed as assistant professors at various institutions. One reason for this imbalance between supply and demand is that in recent years, African politics has enjoyed the emergence of many well-regarded scholars in the field at top PhD-granting programs. These scholars have produced a number of well-trained graduates, but the spate of pandemic-associated hiring freezes has reduced the number of positions available.

Several factors in the field have shaped the diversity of the candidate pool and they each bear mentioning here. Traditionally, African politics in the American academy has been a focus for scholars primarily from the west and parts of Europe. But graduate programs in different parts of the country have made an effort to recruit graduate students from sub-Saharan Africa. This has been spurred on by better training in the SSA countries at the undergraduate and masters’ levels and a notable effort in the field to partner with African scholars and research centers on the continent. One example of this trend is the Sahel Research Group¹² based at the University of Florida, which has been successful in recruiting graduate students from the region.

Central to our recruitment strategy for this hire will be to go back to our informants and to follow up on others who were suggested and remain on our list. We seek to build a network of recommenders of candidates who will, we hope, have a hand in encouraging their graduates and

post-docs to apply to the Carleton job. Moreover, our timing could not be better. If we conduct a search now, we will be tapping a highly talented market at a time in which we have great market leverage to pull in the top candidates. We would also be doing so at a time that is critical to building up our curriculum and that of programs such as Africana Studies before retirements reduce further the number of courses available on SSA at Carleton, particularly in the social sciences.

Mentoring plan

The senior faculty in the department have extensive experience mentoring junior faculty. At present, we have enough senior faculty to mentor the junior faculty we currently have. A new hire would allow us the scale to build a cohort mentoring model based on best practices at Carleton and elsewhere. We would have four junior faculty at similar levels of experience, with Summer Forester the furthest along. Huan Gao, Ryan Dawkins, and a new hire would be at the pre-third-year stage and would benefit from a cohort-based structure. This would allow the senior faculty to more efficiently guide the junior faculty on common questions such as managing the peer review process at disciplinary journals, negotiating with editors at university and commercial presses, securing grants and other forms of external and internal support as well as Carleton-specific questions regarding teaching and third-year/tenure reviews and how to develop faculty-student research partnerships. Several of the senior faculty are BIPOC and have played a leadership role at the College on how we can better support BIPOC faculty. The department as a whole remains firmly committed to the goals of recruiting and supporting the most diverse staffing, so this will continue to be a major dimension of our mentoring plan.

We thank you for the opportunity to submit this proposal. We would welcome the chance to discuss any parts of this proposal with Provost Mattson and the FCPC.
